Hu Kunming (胡坤明) is the penname of activist Jiang Qisheng (江棋生). He is currently the vice president of Independent Chinese PEN Center.

Jiang Fuzhen (姜福祯) is a dissident writer from Qingdao, Shandong Province. He participated in the 1989 democracy movement and previously served eight years in prison.

Jing Chu (荆楚) is the penname of dissident writer Wang Dejia (王德佳) from Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region. He was arrested on December 13, 2007, on charges of “inciting subversion of state power,” reportedly as a result of his online essays.

Ghislain L. Legault is a citizen of Gabon currently working with the United Nations. He received LLM degrees from the University of Caen (France) and University of Wuerzburg (Germany), and is presently working on his PhD in international law, with a focus on human rights in Africa.

Sheng-mei Ma is a Professor of English at Michigan State University, specializing in Asian Diaspora/Asian-American studies and East-West comparative studies.

Michael Posner is president of Human Rights First, and helped found the Fair Labor Association (FLA). Before joining Human Rights First, Michael was a lawyer with Sonnenschein, Nath & Rosenthal, and lectured at Yale Law School. He has been a visiting lecturer at Columbia University Law School since 1984.
